Lesson 1: One God, One People

Lesson 2: Abraham's Visitor's/ Son of Laughter-Story script (Page 1 of 2)





Abraham was sitting outside when three strangers came along. Abraham knew they were special visitors. He went to meet the visitors, bowed before them, invited them into his tent and they began to talk together.

Ask: Who do you think the visitors were? (Ans: Probably God and 2 angels)

One of the visitors asked where Sarah was. The visitor told Abraham that in a year's time Sarah would have a baby son. God had promised to give Abraham and Sarah a big family when they had left their home land, but now they were both very old, too old for children. When Sarah heard what the man said. What do you think she did? (Gather feedback and ask why they chose their answers)

-Put your hand on head if you think she cried and thanked God -Put your hand on your knees if you think she laughed -Put your hand on you ears if you think danced and sang with joy

(Ans: She laughed)

But Sarah's laugh probably wasn't a happy laugh. She probably had tears in her eyes. She laughed because she didn't believe that God could give them a child because they were so old.

However, one year later something wonderful happened. Sarah did have a baby son, just as God had promised! This time Abraham laughed with joy and happiness They called their son Isaac. Ask: Can anyone guess what Isaac's name means? (Take a few answers)

It means 'he laughs'.

And Sarah was laughing in a different way too. Her sadness had turned to joy. She was laughing with happiness about her baby boy.

Sarah said, "God has brought me laughter, and everyone who hears about this will laugh with me."And she added, "Who would have said to Abraham that Sarah would nurse children? Yet I have borne him a son in his old age."

Issac was a really special baby, not just for Abraham and Sarah, who thought they would never have a child. But Issac was special because he was the first child in the family of God.

Lesson 6: Moses- God teaches the Israelites to trust him story script (Page of 1 of 2)

Pre-prepare the food bag of edible items before the lesson, as you read about them using the following script, pupils can eat the corresponding item as they listen.

Quail: Birdie biscuit/part of a penguin biscuit Manna: Water crackers/wafer Worms: Jelly worms

Water: Cup of water to drink Stick: Twiglet/part of a matchmaker Rock: Mini egg/piece of a stick of rock

The Israelites were forgetting all that God had done for them, when he brought them out of slavery in Egypt and saved them from the Pharaoh. They began to grumble and complain against their leaders Moses and Aaron, wishing they were in Egypt instead of the desert. They were very hungry and very tired.

God heard their grumbling and complaining and told Moses he would send bread raining down from the sky in the morning so that the Israelites could go out and gather it to eat every day but on the sixth day of the week they were to gather twice as much, so they could and rest on the seventh day. He promised he would also send them meat to eat in the evening.

That evening the Israelites found quail (eat bird biscuit) on the ground for them, they were happy, there was meat to eat and it was tasty!

In the morning when they woke up there were what looked like thin wafer like flakes all over the ground. The Israelites had never seen anything like it before but Moses told them it was the bread God was giving them to eat (eat wafer). So they gathered what they could, everyone always had enough to eat- no one had too much or too little. Moses told them not to keep any until the next day but some of

the Israelites didn't listen and took more than they needed that day. When they woke up the next morning the bread had gone bad and was full of maggots (eat jelly worm). Ewww, disgusting! They couldn't eat it.

Day after day God gave them enough bread, which they called manna and meat to eat.

But after a while the Israelites complained against Moses again, they complained they were very thirsty and there was no water to drink (drink water). Moses cried out to God asking him what he should do.

God heard him and told Moses to take his staff (eat Twiglet/Matchmaker) and some of the other leaders of the Israelites and go to a place called Horeb where he would find a rock. Moses did as God told him. God told him to strike the rock (eat mini egg/rock sweet) and water would flow from it. Moses took his staff, struck the rock and just as God said, water flowed from it and the Israelites had plenty of fresh water to drink.

Even though the had complained and grumbled ALOT, God looked after the Israelites and took care of their needs so they always had enough food to eat and water to drink.

Area of Life	Jesus	Christians today
Childhood- 12 years old	The age of 12 was very important to Jews in the time of Jesus. By the age of 12 Jewish boys were viewed as adults. At 12 Jesus was teaching in the Temple but this was a big shock to be teachings others much older.	There isn't the same emphasis on this age today. But some Christians will make their confirmation around the age of 12. This is a special time when they make the promises their parents made for them at their baptism for themselves. These are promises that say they believe in God and that they will say no to the things that separate them from God.
Rest	The Sabbath was a special day in the week (Saturday) which would have been very important to Jesus as a Jewish boy. It was a day of rest, He wouldn't have done any work. The Religious leaders had lots of strict rules about what you could and could not do on the Sabbath e.g. you couldn't tie knots, harvest, burn anything. By Jesus' day, the Religious leaders had become so strict that they accused Jesus' disciples of breaking the Sabbath because they picked some grain and ate it as they walked through a field on the Sabbath (cf. Luke 6:1-2).	Sunday is seen as a day of rest or the sabbath for Christians because when God created the world the Bible says He rested on the 7th day. (Not everyone does on a Sunday but it is a good principle to have so we aren't rushing around and busy all the time.) Christians believe it is an important time as it's a reminder to be thankful for all they have and a reminder that God is the one who gives them everything they need.
Worship/ Church	The Temple, was a special building where Jews went to worship and meet with God and to offer sacrifices to make up for the bad things they had done and to praise God for the good things He has done. The service would have included prayers and singing as a way to worship and thank God, as well as teaching from the Torah so Jews could learn more about God and the laws they had to follow.	Church Christians go to Church to praise God for who he is and what he has done, to learn about God and what it means to follow him and to meet with God and other Christians. Christians believe that when Jesus died on the cross He took the blame for all our mistakes and was the ultimate sacrifice, He made up for all the bad things we would ever do so people no longer offer sacrifices. Church services look different everywhere but still give space for people to say sorry for the wrong things they've done as well as thanking God for His goodness through prayers and singing.

Education	A Rabbi would have been the person who taught Jesus about God and about the Torah in the Temple. The Torah is the first 5 books of the Bible. Jesus would have learnt things off by heart and been able to recite the Torah. Girls often did not get to go to school or if they did it was only for a short time before they stayed at home and learnt housekeeping skills from the women in their family. As boys got older most of them would leave school and learn a	Christians today, like everyone else, learn from their teachers in school (some children are home-schooled) and learn lots of different subjects. But Christians will also learn about God and following him at Church/SU groups/ Kids clubs/Sunday schools from other older Christians e.g. ministers, leaders. Christians will learn about God and how to follow him from the Bible (paper and digital).
	As boys got older most of them would leave school and learn a family trade- Jesus learnt carpentry from Joseph.

ROLES Jesus (Narrator): Robbers; Victim; Priest; Levite, Samaritan, Innkeeper:





MATERIALS NEEDED

- \cdot The robbers will steal money or a moneybag from the victim.
- The Samaritan should have bandages to care for the victim.

 \cdot The Samaritan carries the victim on an animal, which could be a toy horse or something similar.

He does not really care for the sheep.

Lesson 2: Prayer Space Activities (Page 1 of 4)



1) Our Father

You will need: paper, clothes pegs/pins and pencils/pens for each pupil and scissors.

Explanation: Christians believe that God is a loving parent- his love is even better than any human on earth.

Pupils spend some time thinking about people that need to know/be reminded that they are loved (it could even be themselves) and then they draw round their hands and write the name of one person on the palm of the hand and cut it out. They can spend some time silently praying, asking God to help the person know they are loved and then peg it to a string washing line or pin it to a board in the room.

2) Hallowed be your name

You will need: blue tack, large sheet of card with the words 'Thank you God that you are ______' on it and with lots of space on the rest of the card, names and characteristics of God printed out on pieces of paper (you may want to print a couple of each word).

Explanation: In the Bible, God is known by many different names. Names are often used to describe what a person is like or the kind of person they are- their character.

Pupils can read some of the names and characteristics of God and consider whether any stand out to them. If you want to, they can choose one of the names/characteristics and using blu tack add it to the space in the prayer on the sheet of card. Lesson 2: Prayer Space Activities (Page 2 of 4)

Explanation: Sometimes it can be hard for us to understand what's happening in our lives and in the world around us. It can cause us to feel sad or even angry and have lots of questions. Christians believe that God wants to hear how we are feeling and our questions - even our angry, painful ones.

Display the picture of the world on the screen, you could also have some newspaper headlines or short pieces of information about the country for pupils to read and then give them some time to pray for/think about those issues and places in the world.

4) Give us our daily bread - Help me

You will need: Paper, pencils/pens for each pupil

Explanation: Christians believe that God cares about each and everyone of us and wants to help us with the things that we find difficult or the hard times we face, he wants us to ask him for his help.

Pupils can draw a picture of something they are struggling with or worried about. If they want to, they can ask God to help with it.

5) Give us our daily bread - Thankfulness dough

You will need: A small amount of playdough/plasticine for each pupil

Explanation: Christians believe that God meets our every need (not always our wants) and the good things that are in our lives are special gifts from him.

Lesson 2: Prayer Space Activities (Page 3 of 4)



Pupils think about all the things that are good in their lives (things they enjoy doing, places they go to, people etc.) and spend time thinking about how those things make them feel and to be thankful for them. Then they use their play dough to create one or more things that they are thankful for and can spend time thanking God for them.

6) Forgive us - Sorry Bin

You will need: torn scraps of paper, pens/pencils for each pupil and a bin.

Explaination: Christians believe that we don't always choose to live the way God would want us to- we can do, say and think things that hurt ourselves and others around us. It's important for us to say sorry if we really mean it and and ask for forgiveness.

Pupils can write something that they are sorry for, if they would like they can spend a few moments reflecting on it or pray to God about it and then scrunch up the paper and throw it in the bin.

7) As we forgive those - Forgiveness Stones

You will need: Heavy stones, a bucket/basin filled with water

Explanation: The Bible teaches us that it is important to forgive others when we are hurt by them. Forgiving does not mean we are forgetting what has been done but it means we are choosing to let go of the hurt feelings (we may need to do this more than once and remember that we have chosen to forgive someone) so they don't weigh us down.

Pupils take some time to recall a time when someone hurt them by what they said or did and how they feel about it (angry, sad etc.) as they remember they can lift and hold on to one of the stones. If they want to choose to forgive and let go of the hurt feelings they can put the stone in the water and watch the water cover it. If they don't think they can let the feelings go they can put the stone back.

8) Lead us not into temptation - Be the light

You will need: a variety of light that can be turned on eg. lamps, battery operated candles, torches.

Explanation: Sometimes we are tempted to do the wrong thing: to be unkind, to lie, to be rude, to be lazy, etc. Christians believe that God made us to be better than that. And that God wants to help us be the very best that we can be. God wants to help us choose to do the right thing and go the right way, and to be like a light that shows others the right way too.

Pupils can pick up a light and turn it on. If they want to they can say a quiet hope, or a prayer to God, about choosing the right way and being a light for others.

Lesson 3: Church/Christian Vocabulary Script

Prayer: This is when Christians talk to God and listen to what he has to say to them. It's a bit like a conversation you might have with a friend. Christians believe you can talk to God anytime and anywhere- school, church, at home, when you are on your own or with others. When Christians pray they can do it in lots of different ways; some people talk out loud, others talk quietly into themselves, some people might write down their prayers, some people will move around when they pray or go for a walk outside, others will find a comfortable spot indoors, some people will use their own words to pray and others will use prayers others have written. When people pray they might say thank you to God for something, they might be saying sorry and asking for forgiveness or they might be asking for God to help them or someone else. Christians believe that God will always hear our prayers, sometimes saying yes, no or wait but always answering in the best way for us because he cares and wants us to come and talk to him.

Bible: This is a very special and important book for Christians, they believe it is God's words to them, written down by people long ago. They believe it's God's special message to us to tell us who he is, what he is like and how he wants us to live. There are stories in it from before the time when Jesus was born, these make up the first part of the Bible called the Old Testament. There are stories about Jesus' birth and after and these make up the second part of the Bible called the New Testament. There is all kinds of different writing in the Bible- stories, letters, poetry and eyewitness accounts to name a few.

Sin: This is a word used in the Bible to describe the things that we can think, say or do that aren't the way that God wants us to live e.g. being selfish, lying, hating others.

Worship: The word worship comes from an old term 'worth-ship'. To show that something is important in their lives people will often do or have something to show their dedication and love e.g. supporters of a football team might wear the team football top, go to matches and watch them play regularly. Fans of a band/singer might have posters of them, buy tickets to see them in concert, play their music a lot and know all the words. Christians want to show that God is important to them, they love him and are dedicated to him too.

Lesson 3: Church/Christian Vocabulary Script Continued



Today we can think worship is singing songs and praying but to the first Christians long ago, worship would have been their whole everyday lives. Giving money to charity, caring for someone in need, cleaning a church building, saying kind words etc.

Minister: This is a person is a Christian who has an important role in the church to care for and teach people about who God is and how God wants them to live. They help people to understand what the Bible teaches and how God has something important to say to everyone today. In some churches they may be called a different name such as pastor, priest, reverend, vicar or rector. They do lots of different things such as marrying people, baptisms, visiting and caring for the sick and families and friends of someone who has died, teaching in church, visiting schools- assemblies, RE, SU group (you could talk about local ministers that are connected to your school and discuss with pupils the ways they are involved in school life).

Pulpit: This is a raised platform or raised up enclosed area in a church from where the minister might read the Bible or teach people what the Bible says and what it means for their lives. Some pulpits are decorated and some are plain. A pulpit was to be a visual reminder of the importance of God's word, the Bible and so everyone can clearly see and hear it being read.



Welcome the pupils at the front door of your church, explaining who you are and your connection to the church if they don't know you e.g. minister, worship leader, part of the church family.

Explain that Sunday is a special day in the week for everyone who is part of the church, that it is a time when everyone comes together in this building to discover more about God, getting to know more about him and what it means to follow Jesus.

Time for 'Church Building Treasure Hunt'-pupils walk around the building trying to spot different items e.g. stained glass window, Bible, cross, hymn book, seats, pews etc. or give them questions which they find the answers to as the y explore the church building. Feel free to chat about these different elements while the pupils complete their check list.

Bible

Every Sunday we will always spend time learning from the Bible together. Someone reads a small part of it out loud from the front of church/lectern/pulpit and everyone else listens and thinks about what God wants to teach us through it. The minister/pastor will also spend some time explaining what it teaches us to help us understand.

If there is a lectern or pulpit take the children to it so they see or if you have Bibles in the seats of the congregation or you use screens to show the passage, you can show that too, explaining that people can read along at the same time as someone reads it out loud.

If time permits you could teach them a short interactive Bible story or show a short clip of a Bible story. There are lots of ideas from the SUNI website https://suni.co.uk/schools/bibletimeline/



Worship

Something else we also do is sing songs to God. We sing to remind ourselves about who God is-our creator etc. and what he is like- he's good, he's loving, he can be trusted, what he has done for us and to say thank-you to God for all those things. We use lots of different instruments and sing lots of different songs-some were written a long time ago, others were written not so long ago.

You could show pupils the different instruments, get them to guess what they are and have some volunteers come and play some. If you have an organ, it would be great for the pupils to see and hear it being played... especially if it was a song they knew.

If time permits you could sing together (use a familiar song from their assemblies or teach one-if possible the song should tie into the theme of your Bible story).

Celebration

As a church we also have times when we celebrate together. Ask the pupils what sorts of things/times do they celebrate with their family? (e.g. birthdays, Christmas, new job etc.)

Ask them how they celebrate? (e.g. party, special food, gifts etc.) Explain that as a church family some of the celebrations you have are called Baptism/ Dedication, Communion, Weddings.

Choose one of the following celebrations to explore further: Baptism Wedding Communion



Lesson 4: A Church Visit





Baptism:

Take pupils to see the Baptismal font or Baptismal pool- you could demonstrate what happens as you explain.

Baptism is a special celebration when someone shows everyone there that they have chosen to follow Jesus or where a Christian parent/s presents their child in baptism. In the Bible during Jesus' day people got baptised in lakes and rivers, today some people still do, others have baptismal pools or fonts like this.

Baptism shows that the person is choosing to follow Jesus. For a baby, the parent/s are making a promise to God that they will be brought up within the church family.

To show this a person could be plunged under the water and brought back up or for a baby, water may be poured over their head in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and they are anointed with oil in the shape of a cross (this is dependent on your tradition). Baptism reminds people that Jesus came to earth to take the blame for the wrong things in our lives and help us make a new start.

Wedding:

A wedding is a special celebration as a man and a woman make special promises to each other in front of their family, friends and God as they become husband and wife.

The church can be decorated with flowers and lots of colour and the man and woman give each other rings as a symbol of the promises they have made.

Show some photos of weddings that have taken place in the church or you could get pupils to volunteer and 'act' out what a wedding can look like-with the exchanging of rings and with props to dress up.

Communion:

In the Bible Jesus just before he was arrested and crucified, had a special meal called the Last Supper with his disciples. During it he gave them some bread and wine telling them that they should take these things as symbols at special times to help them remember about his death on the cross and rising from the dead. The Bible tells us he did this taking the punishment for the wrong things in our lives and so we could be friends with God if we choose to follow Jesus. He told all his followers to keep celebrating communion together to remember all he had done and why.

At this point you could serve the pupils some juice and biscuits and spend time chatting with them.

Compassion

For Christians caring for the poor or those that other people forget about or don't want to spend time is important too, it's what Jesus told his followers to do when he was on the earth. We do this in lots of ways, close to home and far away in other countries.

Take some time to show pictures or take them to places in the church where 'compassion ministries' are organised or run and explain what happens e.g. food hampers-packing and collection point, Operation Child-Christmas shoe box. You could also show them a world map/photos/short videos and share about some of the missionaries from your church/that you support and what they do to share about Jesus and care for others in different countries.

Thank the pupils for coming along to visit, if appropriate you could invite and share some of the activities/organisations that they could come along to, explaining that lots happens during the week, not just on a Sunday.

- Agree to keep learning about God and worship Him. ASK class how they might do this? (Church/prayer/reading Bible/taking communion)
- 2) Turn from the bad things that separate them from God. Christians sometimes call this sin. Give each child a sweet and say they can only suck, not chew it for one minute. Ask them how they got on, drawing out that it was hard/they were tempted to chew. Explain that even when we want to do the right thing, it can be difficult and it is the same for Christians which is why they ask for God's help.
- 3) Tell others about God. ASK class what they do when they find out good news? Draw out the idea that we want to share our good news because we are excited about it. Explain that Christians believe the Bible, which is God's very words, is good news and therefore they want to share it with others.
- 4) Love and Serve Others. There is a very famous phrase which says "Love your Neighbour as yourself" Ask class if they know who said this? (Jesus' words from the Bible, Mark 12:31). Ask class if they know what this means? Christians believe it is important to treat others as we would want to be treated. Ask class to think of examples of how they could do this. (Optional: Ask pupils to draw an example or make a 'Love your Neighbour' poster.)

Ethiopian Official: Who is Isaiah talking about, himself or someone else?

Philip: It's about Jesus! Who came and died, like a criminal, not because he had done something wrong but because mankind had turned their backs on God. He died so that everyone could be friends with God again! This is the Good news of Jesus!

Narrator: The Ethiopian official was so amazed at the Good News of Jesus. As they travelled along he noticed some water.

Ethiopian Official: Look, here is some water. A perfect opportunity for me to get baptised! Nothing stands in my way.

Philip and Ethiopian pretend to step in water and get on knees. Philip leans Ethiopian Official back to dip him into water and pours water over head.

Narrator: So Philip baptised the Ethiopian Official. As they came out of the water the spirit (spirit steps forward and leads Philip away) took Philip away. The Official did not see him again but went away rejoicing about the Good News of Jesus.

Narrator: Philip continued to travel about and tell lots and lots of towns about the Good News of Jesus.

British Isles picture- It is believed that Patrick was born (around 390 AD) and spent his childhood in a village the British Isles (possibly Wales or the coast of England). He came from a Christian family and was the son of a man called Calpurnius who and had an important role (a Deacon) working in the church. Patrick's family was pretty important and wealthy for the times he grew up in (date?).

Slave picture- However, when Patrick was 16 years old he was kidnapped one day by some Irish pirates who took him to a boat and sailed back to Ireland with him. In Ireland they sold him into slavery. Patrick was young, alone and in an unfamiliar place- he was very frightened and unhappy and ended up living there for about six years during which time he learnt the local language.

Sheep picture- As a slave Patrick belonged to man called . He wasn't a very nice master and he treated Patrick very harshly. Often, Patrick would be out in all sorts of horrible weather as a shepherd, looking after his animals and his master would have beaten him if he was unhappy for any reason. It's thought he may have spent time looking after animals near Slemish (Ballymena). Patrick often thought about escaping and trying to return home. It was during his time as a slave that he would have spent the lonely days and nights talking to God. And Patrick realised how much God loved him and how much he needed him and so he chose to follow him, asking God for his forgiveness and help to follow him each day.

Boat picture- One night Patrick had a dream. In the dream a voice told him to run away to the coast of Ireland where he would find and boat and people willing to take him back home to his family. Patrick woke up, he believed that it was God speaking to him in a dream and so he did what he was told and escaped. He walked for days, travelling about 200 miles on foot until he reached a port. Just as the voice had told him, there was a boat and Patrick convinced the captain to take him aboard. They sailed for 28 days until they

landed in Britain and then Patrick walked for 28 days with everyone from the ship. Everyone became very hungry and so Patrick prayed for food and suddenly wild animals appeared so they could kill them and eat. Everyone was amazed and Patrick encouraged them to choose to follow God just like him.

Scroll picture- Patrick reached home when he was in his 20s and was very happy to see his family again but he believed that God was calling him to learn more about him and so he spent years travelling around and learning more and more about God and telling others about God. One day he had another dream in which he received a letter with the voice of the Irish written on it, as he read it begged him to come back to Ireland and 'walk among the people once more'.

Shamrock picture- It wasn't easy but he returned to Ireland and started to tell the people about God.- this often put his life in danger as people were not always happy that he was talking about God It is believed that he used the shamrock to explain to the people in Ireland about who God is and what he is like (Father, Son and Holy Spirit). And over time more people began to choose to follow God and Christianity spread in Ireland. It is thought he died around 807 AD on the 17th March.

Lesson 8: Amy Carmichael (Page 1 of 2)



- Amy was born in Millisle, N. Ireland in 1867

- Her father was a wealthy businessman but one day it lost all it's money and closed. Amy had to drop out of school as the family couldn't afford expensive things, her father passed away and she had to look after her younger brothers and sisters along with her mother.

- After church one Sunday morning she met a poor elderly lady and this changed her life. She started to help others who were in need, teaching children and visiting those in the poorest parts of Belfast.
- Amy bought a tin building to welcome the poor in Belfast and also to teach them the Bible. It is still around today (in a newer building) and is called the 'Welcome Evangelical church'.
- As time passed Amy felt called to serve God as a missionary, overseas in another country, she knew it wouldn't be easy. She was rejected from being a missionary in China because she was small and of poor health.
- She worked for some time in Japan but most of her time was spent in Southern India.
- After a number of years in India, she opened a large hostel with a hospital for children and women in India who had been mistreated.
- One day Amy badly broke her leg and ankle in an accident.
- Due to her injuries she seen the next 20 years in bed, unable to walk. During that time she wrote 37 books and lots of poems to share about God. She was often outspoken about the bad treatment of poor people, which others didn't like to hear.

- Amy died in India in 1951, aged 83.
- She didn't want a gravestone and so a bird bath sits under a tree in Dohnavur to remember her.
- The Dohnavur Fellowship still continues to care for children who have been rescued from dangerous situations today.

Paul and Silas in Prison

19 When her owners realised that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the marketplace to face the authorities. 20 They brought them before the magistrates and said, "These men are Jews, and are throwing our city into an uproar 21 by advocating customs unlawful for us Romans to accept or practice." 22 The crowd joined in the attack against Paul and Silas, and the magistrates ordered them to be stripped and beaten with rods. 23 After they had been severely flogged, they were thrown into prison, and the jailer was commanded to guard them carefully. 24 When he received these orders, he put them in the inner cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

25 About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the other prisoners were listening to them. 26 Suddenly there was such a violent earthquake that the foundations of the prison were shaken. At once all the prison doors flew open, and everyone's chains came loose. 27 The jailer woke up, and when he saw the prison doors open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself because he thought the prisoners had escaped. 28 But Paul shouted, "Don't harm yourself! We are all here!" 29 The jailer called for lights, rushed in and fell trembling before Paul and Silas. 30 He then brought them out and asked, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?"

31 They replied, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved—you and your household." 32 Then they spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all the others in his house. 33 At that hour of the night the jailer took them and washed their wounds; then immediately he and all his household were baptised. 34 The jailer brought them into his house and set a meal before them; he was filled with joy because he had come to believe in God—he and his whole household.

35 When it was daylight, the magistrates sent their officers to the jailer with the order: "Release those men." 36 The jailer told Paul, "The magistrates have ordered that you and Silas be released. Now you can leave. Go in peace."



Lesson 10: William Booth- Salvation Army (Page 1 of 1)



- William was born in 1829 in England.
- When he was a child, his family couldn't afford education for William (you had to pay in those days) and so he began an apprenticeship as a Pawnbroker (a money lender).
- Many years later he taught himself to read and write, this led him to becoming a Methodist minister.
- William married Catherine in 1855. They moved to London, and in 1856 in the East end of London, William began sharing and teaching from the Bible to many people from a tent. This was called 'The Christian Mission'.
- Many years later the 'Christian Mission' was renamed the 'Salvation Army'.
- William and Catherine would have done lots of things to take care of the poor, their motto was 'Soup,
 Soap and Salvation'. They set up shelters for those who were homeless, they campaigned to improve the working conditions, they opened soup kitchens and set up rescue homes for those fleeing dangerous situations.
- The Salvation Army spread around the world and was established in other countries like Canada, France, Switzerland, India, South Africa, Germany; serving in around 130 countries today, helping to support and transform people's lives.
